

What is Real?

Fr Chris Thomas encourages us this Advent to reflect on the heart of the Gospel message.

In just a few weeks

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which

Christmas

I spent my holiday in America this year and at one point when I was in Las Vegas. I was mesmerised by the size of the hotels and the themes that they are built around. I loved the lights which made it seem like day all the time and the fountains which danced majestically to wonderful music. I was amazed to find people at slot machines at 8.30 in the morning. While I enjoyed the buzz and the experience it struck me how unreal it all was and how all of it was built to serve the great god Mammon and to exploit our perceived need for wealth and material goods.

I was reminded of the story of the velveteen rabbit and the question asked of the old skin horse in the nursery: "what is real?" The answer given by the old nursery toy is that 'real' is when you have been loved, really loved, so much so that your joints grow slack and your ears get ripped and your eyes fall out but you don't

really mind because love has made you real. There is a profound wisdom in the story, that love is the only authentic way to discover our own reality and everything else that we think might help pales into insignificance as we discover a life that is vibrant and fulfilling because of the power of love.

"It's all about love"

In just a few weeks time we will celebrate Christmas which really is the feast of love. God became flesh to shatter our illusions about what reality is and to show us the only true reality Love. It's almost as though God has looked at humanity with such compassion and knowing that we will never, of ourselves, understand that love is what makes us real, becomes flesh. Why?

To show us what human reality is all about. In the end to quote St Therese of Lisieux 'it's all about love.'

So the Advent journey is about preparing our minds and our hearts to see that love is at the core of what it means to be both human and divine and because of love we can discover who we really are, beloved children of God with a value and a dignity that noone can take away from us. The challenge of Advent is to open ourselves up to the power of love.

How do we do that? Most of my work these days seems to be about encouraging people to take the time and space to pray and

reflect and allow God to work within us. Part of that process is always the difficult task of facing the things which control us. It's about looking at what motivates us and what at times threatens to engulf us.

Letting go is part of the spiritual life

I'm involved in spiritual guidance and the more I talk to people the more aware I am of just how much 'letting go' is part of the spiritual life. Often the word I'm given when praying with people and listening to them is 'let go'. Many of us hold on to things that stop us seeing that love is the only way. We hold on to our resentment, our unforgiveness our small mindedness and our hurts that sour us and make us see the world through jaundiced eyes. Few of us are willing to recognise our self centredness or the desire we

have for power. We desperately search for acceptance from others and play games with ourselves and with them to make that acceptance a reality.

We con ourselves that we follow the Gospel but use it as a means of shoring our poor self image without allowing it to transform us. Most of us never quite manage to let go of control. We cling on to our own strength and our own capabilities so that even when we cry out to God for help we are still trying to sort things out for ourselves and we call all of this human reality.

We are created for more. The deep discovery of love that knows no end is what makes us real. It's what turns our drab futile grey existence into vital

pulsating life. God became flesh to show us what love is. Dare we this Advent open our hearts and minds to love that transforms and make us real? Take time each day to open yourself to God. Meet love and become love whatever the cost and know the truth that Jesus came that 'we might have life and have it to the full.'

a slow process but we are gradually getting a routine established. We were very fortunate over the summer that Maureen volunteer Evans and her husband, Roger came and did tremendous work clearing the patio at the back so on fine days we have been able to have lunch outside. A heating upgrade is being planned, so please pray that this will be resolved

before the winter properly sets in.

- Kate Moir and Eileen Brum who are part of the healing team of the Westminster Cathedral prayer group are coming regularly on Monday afternoons between 2pm-4pm and offering prayer for healing in the colonnade of the Church. If you would like prayer this is the time to come.
- Once a month, on the 2nd Wednesday between 12 noon and 3pm, we have an evangelistic outreach led by Gabriele and volunteers who come from the different prayer groups to help. This consists of going into the street and giving out vouchers offering free tea and coffee in the colonnade. The team has been amazed at the numbers coming in, of all religions and none, whom they talk to and sometimes pray with. 30 YEARS AND STILL GROWING STRONG

ST VINCENT'S PRAYER GROUP, OSTERLEY

On 16th September the prayer group at St Vincent's parish Osterley in Middlesex celebrated its 30th Anniversary. The group was started in 1983 by the then parish priest, Fr Ronald Richardson, who had been baptised in the Holy Spirit at the famous Hopwood Hall. He invited Joan Hampartsoumian, who had recently moved into the parish, to run the group. This she did with great trepidation as although she had been a member of St Margarets's prayer group in Twickenham, she had never opened her mouth there. About 40 people came to the first meeting whom the parish priest had personally invited. Joan carefully planned with prayers which she read out because she was too nervous to pray spontaneously and shared scripture meditations from a book she bought at a day of renewal

She says, she learnt as she went along how the Spirit could lead. "I remember instead of the hymn we had arranged to sing, another one came into my mind which was more appropriate". Despite the encouraging start numbers soon dropped, until there were only two or three people coming. Joan remembers, "This didn't worry me at all. I knew God had called me as it wasn't my idea and I left it in his hands." More people then did start coming and when numbers had grown to 8, Joan arranged for the whole group to do the Life in the Spirit seminars in Chiswick, where they were all baptized in the Holy Spirit. This had a big effect on the prayer group and they started exercising the gifts of the Spirit in their meetings and their numbers grew to up to 30 people coming each week. They also got a music ministry in the form of Jim, the husband of Monica, who had joined the group when a prayer group nearby closed down. He brought along his guitar and has been coming faithfully ever since.



As the St Vincent's group grew in confidence it was decided that the members of the prayer group themselves would give the talks and be small group leaders for next Life in the Spirit seminars they organised. Another fruit of the prayer group was the small team who included Joan and three others who became involved in a prison outreach to Feltham young offenders institute. Here the religious sister in charge, Sr Margaret had been praying for a charismatic prayer group to help with the prison work. Because of personal family responsibilities, Joan stepped down from leadership and handed over responsibility of the group to Joan Light who led for several years until she in turn handed over to current leader Joseph Andrew. The group has continued to flourish and over the years runs regular days of renewal and Life in the Spirit Seminars. Neil Kieran, who has been in the group for 28 years feels that the secret of its longevity has been the support it has always received over the years from the different parish priests, even if they haven't come to the group themselves. "That has made all the difference", he says.

A young man called David, from St Margaret's, has recently started coming to help out with the music, and a couple of weeks ago, two other young people travelled all the way from Liverpool Street in East London to attend, having seen it in Goodnews. "It's a great sign of new life and the Lord continuing to bless the group," says Joan.

Revival Weekend at Camarthen

The weekend, 30th August-1st September will, hopefully, prove to have been a turning point for Renewal in Wales. The Wales NSC had organised an annual week-long Carmarthen Conference for nearly twenty years but the event had run out of steam by the middle of the last decade. During this time, Renewal in three Welsh dioceses was greatly inspired by the Hereford Conference and in more recent years by the Celebrate weekends held in Cardiff. As a result of encouraging, prophetic words spoken at some days of renewal in recent times, it was decided that the moment had come for the NSC to start afresh. The conference was held at Trinity College, where it had begun.



Under the leadership of the principal speakers, Derek Williams and Andy Stayne, the Conference was led in two directions. From vibrant praise it entered into the heart of our life in the Spirit and outwards into mission. with an opportunity to engage in street ministry. Carmarthen already had a Christian street ministry and Conference members were sent out with them on Saturday afternoon. In short, if Revival in Wales means a commitment to a profound prayer life that leads to generous and courageous Gospel sharing, all who took part in the event came away with

the conviction that this is the way ahead. Canon Matthew Jones spoke of the renewed energy and commitment which those present had experienced saying it felt like an engine building up steam, getting ready to pull out of the station. One to One with the Pope

Michelle Moran shares her memories of her sudden call to Rome for a special private audience with the pope in September this year,

At the invitation of the NSC in Australia I was in Sydney for a couple of days at the beginning of September and then I headed up to Brisbane for the leaders' conference where I was the main speaker. However, on my arrival I got an email from Rome saying that Pope Francis had granted me a private audience in the Vatican at 12.00 noon on Monday September 9th, so please could I arrange things to be there! In Australia it was already Friday afternoon and just a couple of hours before the conference was to begin. So my lead into the first evening of preaching was a series of frantic telephone calls to travel agents and attempts to change my return flight. The main problem was there was very little flight availability and to get everything linking together to get me back to Rome in time for the appointment proved to be more than a challenge and was incredibly stressful. However, God was good and almost at the 11th hour we were finally able to book a flight to Rome which would allow me to do all that I needed to do in Australia and to get to Rome for 10am on Monday morning (you gain time when you fly back to Europe). The people in Australia were really excited by the prospect of the Pope granting me, a representative of CCR worldwide, a private audience so early in his pontificate. They saw this as a sign of the Holy Father's support for Charismatic Renewal. So they prayed with me and sent me out from the other side of the world promising to cover my many hours of travel in prayer.

Thankfully, by God's grace, after travelling 28 hours and the various flight connections working out and planes not too delayed and Monday morning traffic in Rome not too manic, I arrived at the Apostolic Palace in the Vatican with 20 mins to spare. Humanly speaking I certainly did not look or feel my best but inside I was so grateful to the Lord that he had made it possible. For the audience I was together with Matteo Callisi, the President of the Catholic Fraternity, an organisation with a similar standing to ICCRS that has responsibility for serving many of the Charismatic covenant communities throughout the world.



Obviously the nature of a 'private audience' is that the conversation isn't for general publication, so I can only give you a general flavour of our 30 minutes with the Holy Father. In some ways the meeting was quite informal. We spoke as friends about times past when we had been together with him in Buenos Aires and he remembered with fondness some of those early encounters after he was 'converted' to the Charismatic Renewal. When I told him that I had just arrived from Australia, he spoke about Bishop Joe Grech RIP whom he had met at various CCR events in Argentina. The Holy Father emphasised the need to keep in good relationship and dialogue with Pentecostal leaders especially in Latin America.

Fr Raniero Cantalamessa OFM Cap reappointed papal preacher

He shared with us a few things about the present Church situation and re-affirmed the need to keep moving with the freedom of the Spirit in all areas of Church life. He said that he had re-appointed Fr Raniero Cantalamessa as the Papal Preacher. I told him about the fifth ICCRS Leadership Formation Institute that had just begun in Rome and he sent his greetings especially to the students from Argentina. We were able to present to him some of our future projects as we approach the Golden Jubilee of CCR. He was very encouraged by the plans for the 3rd worldwide Priest's retreat in Rome in 2015 and showed



a willingness to help and support us. As we said goodbye there was a great warmth of friendship between us and you almost got the impression that he was saying 'you know where I am, call me if you need anything'.

Holy Father not just supportive of the Charismatic Renewal but he knows the Renewal from the inside

We all know the great gift that Pope Francis is to our Church. However, it is wonderful to know that the Holy Father is not just supportive of Charismatic Renewal. He knows the Renewal from the inside and he has seen and been blessed by the fruits of the Renewal. So we should feel very encouraged during this season in the Church and do all that we can to help the Charismatic Renewal to keep growing in maturity and to keep making an impact through its service in the Church and in the world.

Pope Francis shared with journalists on his flight back from World Youth Day this summer that he originally was rather suspicious of Charismatic Renewal "At the end of the 70s and 80s I wasn't a big fan. I used to say they confused the holy liturgy with a school of samba. I was converted when I go to know them better and saw the good they do. In this moment in the life of the Church, the movements are necessary. They're a grace of the Spirit and in general, they do much good for the Church. The charismatic renewal movement isn't just about winning back a few Pentecostals, but it serves the Church and its renewal."






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
